Thank you for choosing to visit the Minneapolis Institute of Arts for a docent-guided tour. Discussing these guidelines with your students and chaperones ahead of time will ensure that you all have a fun and educational museum visit.



Plan Ahead

Review your tour confirmation(s) to confirm the date and time of your tour(s).

Prepare for a call from your lead docent. The lead docent will contact you in advance to find out about any special needs or requests your group might have. Your docents will select artworks that encourage open-ended discussions about the art.

Discuss the tour with your class. A pre-tour video, available free from the Teacher Resources Office, is a very helpful tool for sparking discussion. To request one, call (612) 870-6333 or e-mail classroommaterials@artsmia.org. You can also ask your students who have visited the MIA before to share their experiences.

Prepare Your Students

The policies below are meant to protect you, your students, and the art. Please make certain that students and chaperones understand group expectations.

Request that your students:

- Stay with your chaperone(s) at all times.
- Stay one foot away from artworks and refrain from touching them. This includes textiles, sculpture, furniture, and paintings.
- Walk carefully and moderate their voices.
- Leave backpacks and coats on the bus or store them at the museum.
- Keep food, drink, and gum out of the galleries.
- Write only with pencils in the galleries and bring a notebook or clipboard to support papers. Walls and display cases should not be used as writing surfaces.
- Keep to the sidewalks or grass to preserve the flowers for everyone's enjoyment.
- Be respectful of the museum's neighbors across the street while waiting for buses.
- Enjoy the art! Ask questions. Share opinions. Join discussions. Identify art they would like to see again and share with family and friends.





Get Ready

Wear name tags. Students in grades K-6 need them, and we encourage older students to wear them as well.

Create small groups before you arrive. Break your class into groups of 15 or fewer students and assign a chaperone to each group.

Prepare Your Chaperones

You will need one adult chaperone for every 15 students (this also applies to high school students). Please recruit additional chaperones as needed for students who require extra attention. For safety reasons, groups without the specified number of chaperones may be kept from entering the museum.

Discuss chaperones roles and expectations ahead of time and make sure your chaperones know the day's schedule. Chaperones' main function is to keep the group together at all times. For this reason, we ask that they not bring preschool children on visits or use cell phones while chaperoning.

To ensure the enjoyment and safety of all visitors, unsupervised or disruptive groups may be asked to leave.

At the MIA

For the bus driver: Ask bus drivers to drop off students at the museum entrance at 2400 Third Avenue South, in the passenger loading zone. Bus parking is available on 24th Street and surrounding Washburn Fair Oaks Park. We ask that drivers turn off their engines while waiting, as a courtesy to the museum's neighbors and the environment.

Please arrive on time. Allow plenty of time for travel, unloading, and checking in, so you're ready to start your tour at the scheduled time. Students should leave backpacks, coats, and books on the bus or store them at the museum.

Check in. When you arrive, check in at the greeter's desk in the front lobby so the greeter can connect your group with its docents.
